Alleluia! Christ is risen! Alleluia!

We are still in the Easter season and thankfully Christ is still risen and joyful gratitude reigns! Alleluia!

Signs of resurrection and the living Christ have been beautifully evident in the past month.

My life is so enriched through young people. A group of Palestinian young people from Bethlehem, many of them theology students, arrived for a three-day retreat and reflection after a two week visit to Johannesburg and Cape Town. What an energetic, articulate and dedicated group! They gave Volmoed an olive wood cross with the Lord's Prayer written in Aramaic. They spent time in guided reflection and silence. They visited the drum making factory in Zwelihle, and the young people gave them a drum for Bethlehem Bible College. They drummed, sang and talked together, with high energy.







The drummers visited the Quest women's group in Hermanus who provided the perfect ocean and mountain backdrop for the drum circle, along with perfect weather. As they were welcomed, a pod of dolphins appeared in the ocean. Many women drummed for the first time. The young people told the story of how a drum is made, each one taking a turn to tell what task they do. Their public speaking training was done by one of the Quest members, and this helped them with their nervousness. They did a great job!








Life with VYLTP is always exciting and also enriching. The current focus in the Thursday program is on spirituality and spiritual practices. This is a seven week course that I am doing with them, based on the course I did last year as a project for the Shalem retreat leadership course. The intent is to explore practices that open our hearts to God's presence, discover the power and healing of God's presence in silence, and its importance for leadership. Each time they learn about a practice, they try it out, sit in silence afterwards, then journal about the experience. They share with someone who speaks their own language, and some choose to share in the larger group.

Thus far they have tried breath prayers as a form of centering prayer, a five minute version the Examen in Ignatian spirituality, and visio divina. Visio divina involves choosing a picture intuitively from a number of varied pictures, gazing at it for some time, sitting in silence, then journaling about the experience. This new cohort is very open, and those in their second year are clearly deepening in their understanding and awareness.

This ninety minute session each Thursday is a joy. On the drumming days in Zwelihle, they take ten minutes before lunch to sit in silence as a way to find space for quiet and prayer in their ordinary lives and not just at Volmoed.


